Our April speaker: Dr. Mark Bradley, historian and author

Dr. Mark Bradley is a historian with the U.S. Army Center of Military History in Washington, DC and the authority on the surrender of Joseph Johnston to William T. Sherman on April 26, 1865. He received his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Dr. Bradley has written two books on the end of the Civil War in North Carolina: Last Stand in the Carolinas: The Battle of Bentonville, and This Astounding Close: The Road to Bennett Place, which was a finalist for the 2001 Lincoln Prize.

The title of Mark's talk is Bentonville: <u>THE LAST GRAND CHARGE OF THE CONFEDERACY</u>.

In February 1865, Union Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman led his army northward from Savannah, Georgia, into the Carolinas. His objective was Richmond, Virginia, the capital of the Confederacy. Sherman planned to join forces with the Union Army's general in chief, Lt. General Ulysses S. Grant, and the Army of the Potomac to defeat Gen. Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, thus bringing the war to a victorious conclusion. On February 22, 1865, Lee placed Gen. Joseph E. Johnston in command of the Confederate forces in the Carolinas and directed him to stop Sherman's advance. On March 19, Johnston attempted to defeat an isolated column of Sherman's army at Bentonville, North Carolina. Occurring just three weeks before Lee's surrender at Appomattox Court House, the battle of Bentonville was the last major Confederate offensive of the war




Ramblings from the Raffle Table
