Speaker: John Michael Priest

Topic: "Gettysburg Veterans and PTSD"

A retired high school history teacher, John Michael Priest has been interested in Civil War history since an early age. He is a graduate of Loyola College in Baltimore and Hood College in Frederick, Maryland, and has written extensively about the Civil War.

His many books include Antietam: The Soldiers' Battle (1989); Before Antietam: The Battle for South Mountain (1992); Nowhere to Run: The Wilderness, May 4th & 5th, 1864 (1995); Victory Without Triumph: The Wilderness, May 6th & 7th, 1864 (1996); and Into the Fight: Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg (1998). Praised by legendary historian Edwin C. Bearss as the "Ernie Pyle" of the Civil War soldier, Priest appeared on the Discovery Channel's Unsolved History: Pickett's Charge (2002), and is one of the historical consultants for the forthcoming miniseries To Appomattox. His most recent work; Stand to It and Give Them Hell (2014), chronicles the Gettysburg fighting from Cemetery Ridge to Little Round Top on July 2, 1863, through the letters, memoirs, diaries, and postwar recollections of the men from both armies who struggled to control that "hallowed ground."

Mr. Priest's presentation is about using photography to compare known photos of PTSD cases with those of the Civil War and suggesting the possible connections which could indicate the existence of Soldiers' Heart, a common name for PTSD at the time.

In Case You Missed It......


At our October meeting we were treated to a presentation on "The Life and Death of James Johnston Pettigrew." George Franks III described Pettigrew as probably the most educated man in the Confederacy, graduating from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill as valedictorian in 1847. He witnessed the bombardment of Fort Sumter and served briefly in a South Carolina Regiment before becoming Colonel of the 22nd NC Infantry in August, 1861. He was wounded and captured at the battle of Seven Pines in 1862 and eventually exchanged in the summer of the



same year, but missed the Virginia and Maryland Campaigns of 1862. When the Army of Northern Virginia reorganized after the death of "Stonewall" Jackson, Pettigrew became a brigade commander of North Carolinians in Henry Heth's Division in A.P. Hills Third Corps. His four regiments consisted of over 2500 troops and one of the largest brigades in the ANV. His brigade suffered crippling losses on the first day of Gettysburg and was placed on the left flank of the final assault on Cemetery Ridge on the third day despite being wounded. On the retreat from Pennsylvania his brigade was the last to cross into Virginia, and was mortally wounded by a Union Cavalryman just before he moved to the Potomac River at the battle of Falling Waters. His loss was mourned in the South as he was also thought to be a competent successor to Confederate President Jefferson Davis. 






Jubal: The Life and Times of General Jubal A. Earl, CSA

Did you know that the origin of the name *Jubal* is from the Book of Genesis, meaning "Father of Musicians"? Maybe not the first image that pops into your mind when thinking about Jubal Early. He was born in Virginia in 1816, the third of ten children within an old and connected Virginia family. He graduated from West Point, saw action against the Seminole Indians, fought in the Mexican American War, practiced law, and commanded a corps in the Confederate army. Osborne's book covers Early's war time adventures and includes the controversies that surround the man – decisions made at Gettysburg, his raid on the Nation's Capital and his post-war writings that helped shape the "Lost Cause" movement in the South.

<u>Civil War Curiosities: Strange Stories, Oddities, Events and Coincidences</u> by Webb Garrison



Webb Garrison, a former dean of Emory University, wrote more than 50 books, including books on Civil War facts, myths, and curiosities. Garrison provides a collection of strange and bizarre anecdotes, coincidences, and unusual stories. Read about faithful canines, York and Jack, following their masters into battle. Learn why so many US Navy ships were given Indian names such as the USS Black Hawk, the USS Cherokee, or the USS Chickasaw. Or, discover the average daily death rate in the notorious Andersonville Prison.
