


In Case You Missed It......

We had almost 30 in attendance at our September meeting. Our speaker Dennis Frye challenged us to think more deeply when we read and research history. Even the writings of well-known or revered historians can be suspect, even if sources are noted. Dennis Frye is known for challenging convention sparking provocation. In his latest book, "Antietam Shadows: Mystery, Myth & Machination," Frye dispels some of the often repeated "facts" about Antietam and the first invasion of the North. He began presentation by establishing his theme with the first line of his book: "What is history, but a fable agreed upon," a quote from Napolean. As an example, he reexamines in his book the famous Antietam quote by Lee "we will make our stand on these hills" as the Confederate line (really an advanced line) at the Sunken Road was

driven back. The Lee quote appears in Douglas Southall Freeman's biography of Lee and was attributed to a soldier in the 11th Virginia Infantry named Morgan. Personnel records revel that Morgan had been taken ill about the time of the Seven Days' battles near Richmond and didn't return to his unit until September 25, 1862 (you do the math). When some stories or accounts are repeated enough they sometimes become accepted as fact in the historical record. Many more such examples may be found in "Antietam Shadows." You can pick up a copy of Frye's books online or at a battlefield gift shop.








Treasurer's Report for September



Dr. Allan Nevins, historian, journalist, and Pulitzer Prize winner has written more than 50 books on business history as well as biographies and books on the civil war. His four-volume in depth series on The War for the Union is considered a meticulously researched treasure. The last two volumes won the National Book Award.

In addition to his many newspaper and academic articles, his books involve extensive, in-depth research and a vigorous, almost journalistic writing style. Subjects of his biographies include: Grover Cleveland, Abram Hewitt, Hamilton Fish, Henry Ford, John C. Frémont, Herbert Lehman, and John D. Rockefeller. For our October meeting, we are fortunate to have both Volumes I and II of Nevins work ready to raffle.

The first volume, <u>The Improvised War 1861-1862</u>, opens with Lincoln's inauguration and the chaos he faced and ends with Secretary of War Cameron's departure amidst accusations of corruption and the arrival of Secretary Stanton.

The second volume, <u>War Becomes Revolution 1862-1863</u>, begins with Lincoln's growing admiration for Grant's abilities and ends with the shake-up of Union officers and new challenges brought on by the war to feed, clothes, transport, and arm the soldiers.



BOOK REVIEW by MATT BORDERS

Daniel J. Vermilya, *That Field of Blood: The Battle of Antietam, September 17, 1862.* 192 pp. photos, maps, appendices. \$14.95 (Paperback) ASIN: B07DHPDJXH

One of the Frederick Civil War Round Table's favorite speakers, Dan Vermilya, has another book out! His third book, *That Field of Blood: The Battle of Antietam, September 17, 1862*, is a guide



book to Antietam National Battlefield. Antietam was Dan's first posting in the National Park Service and he knows the battlefield intimately. This work gives readers an in-depth overview of the first Confederate invasion of the north in 1862, covering the movements of both armies during the campaign, as well as the fighting itself. This is not an exhaustive campaign study, instead this is a great back book to take with you while tromping the battlefield landscape.

Dan has included extensive images spread throughout *That Field of Blood*, both historic, of officers and soldiers, as well as modern views of the battlefield. The modern images are very helpful as it aids the reader in identifying what area of the field is being described. In just the last two years Antietam National Battlefield, with the help of its preservation partners, has obtained several pieces of the historic landscape that had been in private hands. These lands are now under the protection of the National Park Service and Dan was able to document them and discuss the movements across them in his work. Also aiding the reader are the maps. Drawn by Hal Jasperson, a cartographer who is well known

in the Civil War community, these maps show the various attacks and counter attacks across the bloody fields of Antietam. These give the reader a sense of structure to an otherwise chaotic engagement.

Beyond the battles and bloodletting are the stories of the civilians caught up in the tragedy of the Maryland Campaign. The Poffenberger's, Piper's, Mumma's and Roulette's are all mentioned, as are the citizens of Sharpsburg and Shepherdstown. This work does a good reminding the reader and battlefield visitor that this one terrible day in American history had a profound effect on the people who lived there, both in the immediate aftermath of September 17th and for years to come.

My one issue with *That Field of Blood* has to do with the series this book is a part of. I have had serious reservations about the Emerging Civil War Series since it began. This is not due to the authors' or the subject matter, as I know several very good historians who have written for the

series and the topics of the series are excellent. However, it is the policy of this series to NOT include footnotes, end notes or a bibliography in the book. This is due to the series editor's belief that most readers of history do not care about such things. Even if that is the case I do not think it does the author any credit for his or her work to not include these staples of a well -researched and documented history. Perhaps I am overly critical or out of touch with the reader who is reading a work of history purely for enjoyment. To the series credit, while the actual citations are not in the book, a link is included in the table of contents for the notes and bibliography. In Dan's case he wrote a lengthy essay explaining his corresponding documents and why he chose them, as well as providing a lengthy bibliography at the end of the assay.

In the end *That Field of Blood* does a great job providing the reader with a well written, concise and easy to follow tour of Antietam National Battlefield. Dan has used extensive quotes from the personal writings and official reports of the participants, as well as interweaving the story of his own great-great grandfather, who was killed in the battle, into the narrative. He has also used his own contacts in the Civil War community to strengthen this piece, noted Rangers John Hoptak and Brian Baracz both add to the work with the forward and an appendix respectfully. My own reservations about the format of the series aside, I highly recommend this book as an excellent starting point for an overview of the Maryland Campaign and the Battle of Antietam.
