Speaker: Sharon Murray

Topic: "Escape from Harper's Ferry"

Sharon Murray a native Idahoan who moved to West Virginia in 2010 to travel & study history. She has degrees in mining engineering and history from the University of Idaho and has worked in both underground and surface precious metal mines and in state government managing the State of Idaho's mineral leasing and mined land reclamation programs. Sharon has published a number of articles on Idaho mining history and won awards for photographs from the International California Mining Journal and the Civil War Trust. She has been a volunteer at Antietam National Battlefield since 2010 and a certified guide there since 2014.

Ms. Murray's presentation is titled "Evading Capture: Union Cavalry Escape from Harpers Ferry, September 14, 1862." The presentation covers the key players

involved in organizing and carrying out the escape, the escape route, the capture of a confederate ammunition train, and those who were credited with planning the escape.



In Case You Missed It......

Mr. Alann D. Schmidt presented his research on the Dunker Church at the Antietam Battlefield to 30 members and guests of the Frederick County Civil War Roundtable on the 21st of March. Throughout the famous battle and beyond, the church stood as the easily recognizable reference point for soldiers and officers of both sides. Originally built on land donated by the Mumma's for

use by local Dunker congregation. The Dunker's are originally a German Baptist denomination migrating to locations throughout Maryland, given the name for their literal baptismal tradition. Although the church was damaged during the battle, it remained






standing but eventually its congregation moved to a new Church on Main Street of Sharpsburg. The building was destroyed by


weather in the 1920's but rebuild for commercial use as the area around it grew with housing. As THE historic point on the Battlefield, with the support of the Government of Maryland and Historical Societies, the Church was restored and the adjacent lands acquired to become what we see today as the Battlefield Park. The presentation Mr. Schmidt gave on his jointly authored book entitled "September Mourn" by Alann D. Schmidt and Terry W. Barkley tells this forgotten story of the Church and how it came to the restored state we see today.

Always a popular book at our raffles, Team of Rivals is a riveting account of Lincoln's election to the Presidency and his challenges working with a cabinet of disgruntled Republican opponents which included Seward, Chase, Cameron, and Bates. Lincoln emerges as a masterful manager who is able to marshal their talents to navigate the enormous challenges of abolishing slavery and ending the Civil War. Author Doris Kearns Goodwin taught at Harvard and worked at the White House for Lyndon B. Johnson where she assisted him on his memoirs in her bestselling Lyndon Johnson and the American Dream. She followed up with the Pulitzer Prize—winning account of Franklin & Eleanor Roosevelt and earned the Lincoln Prize for her bestseller Team of Rivals.



Our next featured book is a departure from our normal selection of non-fiction and is a trilogy of acclaimed fictional stories of the war. The three best sellers included in this book are: The Killer Angels (Michael Shaara), Andersonville (MacKinlay Kantor) and The Red Badge of Courage (Stephen Crane). The collection is edited by Marc Jaffe who was the former editorial director for Bantam Books who later formed his own brand as Marc Jaffe Books.
