Speaker: Dennis W. Duerbeck

Presentation Overview: Live display and explanation of Civil War and Pre-Civil War Artillery and Artifacts.

This month, Dennis Duerbeck presents his marvelous collection of Civil War Artillery items, back in person at the National Museum of Civil War Medicine.


BIO: Dennis is the serving Vice President of the Pipe Creek Civil War Round Table in Westminster, MD, his

interest in the Civil War began in 1960, learning that his maternal grandfather, Fred Kegel, related a story of his attempt to join the Army. Due to Fred's young age, he was denied but was offered a chance to feed and water horses in Baltimore. Collecting Civil War relics

since this 1962 purchase of two "minnies" at the Jenny Wade House in 1962. He continued to build his collection between 1962 and 1972 while in the Navy. Discharged in 1972 the focus then became Field Artillery from 1840 - 1865. If it has to do with the Artillery, it becomes part of the collection. He has presented the 1814 U. S Sea Fencible interpretation at FT. McHenry for approx. 17 years. He is a past member and Governor with The Company of Military Historians. He and spouse Nadine conduct an ongoing Artillery and nurse interpretation at the George Spangler Farm in Gettysburg.

February Book Review

REVIEW:

Bruce Mowday, Pickett's Charge: The Untold Story. 232 pp. Pictures, \$15.87 (paperback)

You may recall that we had Bruce Mowday as a speaker a few months back and he gave an excellent presentation about his book, <u>Pickett's Charge: The Untold Story</u>. This work lives up to its title as it is focused on the Union defense of Cemetery Ridge and the Union center, as opposed to another retelling of the Confederate attack on July 3, 1863. While Mr. Mowday does take a look at other Union elements along Cemetery Ridge, he primarily focuses on the II Corps and specifically the Philadelphia Brigade.

That name is probably ringing a few bells as the Philadelphia Brigade had a history of operating in Maryland. The brigade traced its founding to Colonel Edward Baker, who had tried to raise a California regiment for the eastern theater early in the war. While he was able to form a company of Californians, the majority of his command came from Philadelphia. His Pennsylvanians turned Californians were organized into four regiments, designated the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 5th California Infantries. Once organized, the brigade was sent to Poolesville, Maryland in late 1861 as part of the Corps of Observation that was guarding the Potomac River crossings. On October 21, 1861, these men were involved in the Union debacle at Ball's Bluff where Edward Baker commanded the brigade and was killed in action. With Baker's death, the California titles were dropped, and the regiments were soon redesignated the 69th, 71st, 72nd, 106th, Pennsylvania Infantries, now known as the Philadelphia Brigade.

This brigade served through the Peninsular Campaign and in fall of 1862 marched through Frederick, Maryland as part of the Army of the Potomac. Commanded by the one-armed Brigadier General Oliver O. Howard, the Philadelphia Brigade sustained 545 casualties in the terrible fighting in the West Woods at Antietam. That winter the Philadelphia Brigade went forward at Fredericksburg as part of one the II Corps futile attacks against the stonewall. As with the others, this attack too was beaten back with significant losses.

By 1863 the brigade was a highly experienced command, though the discipline off the battlefield seemed to be lacking. Due to this, the brigade was given a new commander in the days leading up to Gettysburg, Brigadier General Alexander Webb. Webb was a new general officer and was a by the book disciplinarian. While he and his new command did not necessarily get off on the best foot, it was Webb who led the brigade's defense of the Angle at Gettysburg and earning the Philadelphia Brigade everlasting fame.

Old Baldy Civil War Roundtable of greater Philadelphia. OBCWRT has been in existence for 45 years, and like the Frederick County CWRT, is dedicated to educating and preserving the history of the Civil War. Rich Jankowski, our President, suggested I reach out to you.
