Speaker: Susan Ashman, Park Ranger, and Historic Weapons Supervisor

Presentation Overview: Finding R.H. Weakley

This month Susan Ashton poses the very interesting series of historical questions; we've all heard the expression, "if walls could talk", but what about historic firearms? What could they tell us about the soldiers that carried them and the battles they fought? Join Park Ranger Susan Ashman as she unravels the mystery of a battle damaged 1853 British Enfield Rifle and the tragic story of Pvt. R.H. Weakley, CSA.

BIO: Ranger Susan Ashton is originally from Southern California, Susan served in the United States Air Force for 8 years as an Aircraft Hydraulic Systems Mechanic. She worked at Old Sturbridge Village for over 10

years as a costumed historic interpreter. Susan is the Lead Park Ranger and Historic Weapons Supervisor at Springfield Armory National Historic Site in Springfield, MA.

In Case you Missed it



During our April meeting of the Frederick County Civil War Roundtable with Mr. Harry Smeltzer, we hosted the event once again both live and streaming through our partners at the National Museum of Civil War Medicine. Harry shared a most fascinating story to a viewing audience of 20 in person attendees and a large on-line audience viewing thru live streaming, a comparison based on historical documents from the time of McDowell's Plan for First Bull Run and discussing if he actually did achieve it. He probed in a detailed fashion the expectations and intentions of Brigadier General Irvin McDowell for the campaign which culminated in the battle of July 21, 1861. Through the use of existing and easily

available primary documents and military theory of the day, he argued that the traditional interpretation of McDowell's "plan" and the

reasons for its failure are in contradiction, and that he acted in accordance with what he intended to do, executed tactical strategies that were entirely congruent with the Union mindset and military doctrine during the time when the battle unfolded.



He left the audience to do our own deconfliction of the facts comparing what McDowell stated he was going to do to what he did, perhaps Post-Bull Run analyses of the facts yielded a flawed



hypotheses that he did not succeed in the plan he devised. The large distinction between "a turning" and "a flanking".

Antonio Tobias (Toby) Mendez is a Maryland based sculptor with over 25 years of experience creating significant works of art. Born in Colorado in 1963, Toby spent most of his childhood in Japan and Thailand. In 1974, his family moved to Maryland where Toby attended sculpture classes and honed his fine art skills in a gifted and talented program for young artists. Through this intensive creative experience, at the age of 16, Toby chose sculpture as his career path.

After high school, Toby apprenticed with the Academy Award winning makeup sculptor John Chambers. He then entered the Art Institute of Chicago where he learned the processes of bronze casting practiced by sculptors and fine art foundries for centuries. This hands-on technical experience afforded Toby the early opportunity to cast his own works in bronze and to accept his first commissions. Toby also went abroad for a year in Spain where he studied the techniques used in creating large scale monuments.

In 1988, Toby set up his studio in the Maryland/DC area. Toby primarily focuses on the figure, combining a classical approach with a contemporary eye for site design. In addition to creating lasting legacies through public art, Toby continues to create personal works for acquisition by private collectors. Toby's untiring work as a sculptor for over 25 years, allows for the unique sensibility and insight in his work. This is well noted in his public works such as his Thurgood Marshall Memorial and The Teammates for the Boston Red Sox.

Old Baldy Civil War Round Table Symposium 29-30 April (early bird tickets available until 1 Apr)

Old Baldy Civil War Roundtable of greater Philadelphia. OBCWRT has been in existence for 45 years, and like the Frederick County CWRT, is dedicated to educating and preserving the history of the Civil War. Rich Jankowski, our President, suggested I reach out to you.

Every several years we put on a symposium where we assemble nationally known speakers. This year with the cooperation of Rutgers University, we will be hosting on April 29/30 a symposium focusing on the western theater and the coordination of the army and navy in opening up the Father of the Waters, the Mississippi. In the east, by proximity of geography, there is a focus and familiarity with the eastern theater. This symposium is designed to provide a foundation of understanding for what was occurring in the west, especially during 1863. Arguably, what was happening in Tennessee, Mississippi, and Louisiana, was as critical to the outcome of the war as the events in the east. Grant's ultimate success in the east follows his incredible campaign in the west, often considered one of the greatest military campaigns in world history.
