
Presentation Overview: Francis Barlow & the 61st New York Infantry

The Round Table is excited to present this month's speaker, Mr. Anthony Trusso, who will present a program that will focus on the early days of one of the hardest fighting regiments in the United States Army during the War, the 61st New York Infantry. By war's end, this regiment saw action in every major campaign of the Army of the Potomac, captured 4+

Confederate flags, and could list as its commanders Francis Barlow and Nelson A. Miles. An emphasis will be placed on early command struggles of the regiment, the emergence of Francis Barlow and seeing the elephant outside of Richmond.


Presenters BIO: Anthony Trusso is a public historian with an interest in the soldier's experience. He has an interest in following the 61st New York Volunteer Infantry Regiment and its second commander Francis Barlow. He holds a BA in history from Fairleigh Dickinson University. Anthony is a contributor to Emerging Civil War and the Civil War Times, as well as a Ranger at Manassas National Military Park. He loves to road trip to find unique or off the beaten path historic sites and the best barbecue.

In Case you missed it



Our December offering to the roundtable, friends and guests featured Dr. Alex Rossino who presented a most fascinating body of research to uncover the truth to the motives of General Robert E. Lee in his historic campaign into

Maryland in September of 1862. Most students of the Civil War believe the story of Robert E. Lee's 1862 Maryland Campaign is complete, and that new studies must rely on interpretations long-since accepted and understood. General Lee was perhaps not forced to incur into enemy territory but sought to gain the trust of a prospective friendly state. Dr. Rossino thoughtfully asked and





discussed the question; What if the histories previously written about the first major Confederate operation north of the Potomac River missed key sources, proceeded from mistaken readings of the evidence, or were influenced by Lost Cause ideology? Dr. Rossino demonstrates that these types of distortions continue to shape modern understanding of the campaign and offers suggestions for how to correct them, developing in the process a new understanding of what General Lee hoped to accomplish in Maryland, his work of historical research was accompanied by a historical fiction spanning the same time period.

January Book Review

Crossing the Deadly Ground: United States Army Tactics, 1865-1899, Perry D. Jamison: The University of Alabama Press, 1994. xi + 154 pp. + notes and illustrations, \$39.95 (hardback), ISBN 978-0817307608.

Following the terrible bloodletting of the American Civil War it was clear that defensive tactics had dominated the battlefields of the United States and in almost every case, prevailed. The dash and drive of the attack had been superseded by the cold efficiency of earthworks and long-range fire power. That did not mean that the desire to attack, what French military minds termed elan, had diminished in the minds of United States officers, they just had to figure out a better way to cross the literal "Deadly Ground". To take on this issue there was a series of meetings, first in Washington, and later at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas by a board of officers beginning in the late 1880's. What they published in 1891, became the first true tactics manual in United States military history. Up until this point, there had been numerous drill manuals for each branch of the service, the most popular in the American Civil War had been, Hardee's, Casey's and Gilham's manuals for infantry and light infantry. There were also numerous other variations thrown in. Each of these manuals essentially said the same thing. They were translations from French military manuals that were then adapted for American use. The differences between them were slight, usually being variations in pacing, or the number of steps it took to load and fire. The closest there was to implementation of these drills in any tactical way were the variations in ways a battleline could fire during combat and the skirmish drill.

The 1880's board of officers hoped to rectify this by really looking at how to attack and defend. They did this by emphasizing smaller unit tactics. No longer would the basic element be a regiment, or even a company, but smaller more elastic formations, similar to skirmish lines. Those soldiers were thrown out in front of a line of battle and were expected to act as either an early warning for the battleline, or to push forward aggressively to engage an opponent's skirmishers and develop oppositions line of battle. The tactics developed and suggested by the board, became the basis of the small unit tactics of the 20th century. Though how well they were used, especially in the Spanish-American War and World War One, is highly debatable. This was due in large part to the condition of the United States Army in the late 19th century. Since the Civil War, there had been very limited opportunities for drilling and training large quantities of men in new, more modern tactics. Instead, the United States Army had been spread out across the west, fighting mostly small actions against the indigenous population. Beyond the practical difficulties, there was also resistance within the army itself. There were many officers who still believed in the attack and that all their men needed was more drive or encouragement. This resistance to change and the unwillingness to acknowledge the superiority of defensive firepower was seen a few times during the brief war with Spain but was on full display during World War One. While much of this work details the Army's failure to modernize its thinking and tactics, even after its own officers recommend it, Dr. Jamieson does delve into how the defensive conundrum was eventually overcome. A defensive position today is still something that gives commanders pause, but the development of new technologies, beyond just weapons, Dr. Jamieson argues is what allows for new, more efficient, and deadly tactics against these positions. This is a shorter work with a lot of excellent details, a great read for anyone interested in the progress of military thinking in the United States.



JUNE 9-14, 2023

For nearly 40 years, the Civil War Institute at Gettysburg College has hosted a premiere annual summer conference bringing leading historians and public audiences together. Sessions, lodging, and meals are held on the 200-acre college campus.

The 2023 CWI Conference will feature a wide range of topics, including Lincoln as Commander in Chief, the Civil War in Appalachia, Harriet Tubman, John Singleton Mosby, Confederate widowhood, retaliation in the American Civil War, the Army of Tennessee, and more.

In addition to touring the Gettysburg battlefield, participants will have the opportunity to visit a variety of other nearby battlefields and historic sites on tours that will explore Antietam and Harpers Ferry, or to combine a half-day of focused class work with a half-day out on the battlefield, exploring, in-depth, the actions on the 1st or 3rd day of battle at Gettysburg. Participants who may prefer a shorter, more physically active conference experience can also choose to sign up for our new "active track" package, featuring a combination of Friday and Saturday morning lectures and a day and a half of walking-intensive tours of the Gettysburg battlefield on Saturday and Sunday, exploring the First Day's battlefield and the Union Fishhook, off the beaten path!

This conference will also continue the popular "lunch-in" and "dinein" small group discussions with CWI faculty.

The 2023 conference will offer something for everyone, from longtime students of the Civil War to those who are new to Civil War history.
