Speaker: Chris Bryan

Presentation Overview: Cedar Mountain to Antietam: A Civil War Campaign History of the Union XII Corps, July – September 1862

Chris Bryan's Cedar Mountain to Antietam: A Civil War Campaign History of the Union XII Corps, July –September 1862 begins with the formation of this often-luckless command as the II Corps in Maj. Gen. John Pope's Army of Virginia on June 26, 1862, (the II Corps,

Army of Virginia becomes the XII Corps, Army of the Potomac). Bryan explains in meticulous detail how the corps endured a bloody and demoralizing loss after coming within a whisker of defeating Maj. Gen. "Stonewall" Jackson at Cedar Mountain on August 9; suffered through the hardships of Pope's campaign before and after the Battle of Second Manassas; and triumphed after entering Maryland and joining the reorganized Army of the Potomac. The men of this small corps earned a solid reputation in the Army of the Potomac at Antietam that would only grow during the battles of 1863. This unique study, which blends unit history with sound leadership and character assessments, puts the XII Corps' actions in proper context by providing significant and substantive treatment to its Confederate opponents. Bryan's extensive archival research, newspapers, and other important resources, together with detailed maps and images, offers a compelling story of a little-studied yet consequential command that fills a longstanding historiographical gap.

Presenters BIO: Chris Bryan is a native of Franklin County, Pennsylvania. After graduating from the United States Naval Academy with a B.S. in History, he served as a naval aviator for eight years. He has since worked as a project manager, during which time he earned an M.A. in Liberal Arts from St. John's College in Annapolis, Maryland and a Masters in Historic Preservation from the University of Maryland, College Park where his studies focused on architectural investigations of antebellum domestic and agricultural outbuildings in the Chesapeake Bay region. Chris Bryan lives in Southern Maryland with his wife and two kids.

Our speaker this month is M. Chris Bryan, who will be speaking to us on just this topic. I had the pleasure of meeting Chris a few months ago at the Antietam Institute Conference and he is going to give a great talk on

the development of the XII Corps and its early history from Cedar Mountain to Antietam.

February Book Review

The Tale Untwisted: General George B. McClellan, the Maryland Campaign, and the Discovery of Lee's Lost Orders by Gene M. Thorp & Alexander B. Rossino Savas Beatie – February 2023

The title and the authors of this volume will be familiar to many members of this round table. They spoke here back when they published their first version of this research as an electronic monograph several years ago. So I had some reservations when I heard that it was being published as a 'real book' wondering if there was enough substance to add to justify re-releasing it in a longer paper and E-book version. I should not have been concerned. First of all it is being published by Savas Beatie who is known for the quality of their Civil War Titles. Second, knowing the authors I should have known they wouldn't put the time into the project if it wasn't worthy.

The book begins by explaining how for over 150 years a mythos has been created and accepted as truth around General McClellan's actions during the Maryland Campaign of 1862. The authors show how it began as what would be called today a 'hit job' during McClellan's 1864 presidential campaign. They show how it took hold in following years. They don't spend much time on the actual discovery of the orders, that is pretty well trodden ground. What they do is describe how the orders affected McClellan's decision making and information flow through the Army of the Potomac (AoP). They build a case for the steps McClellan took based on a solid timeline of what information he received and when he received it. They go into great, but clear detail about the mistakes that have been made in the transcribing of messages and how that affected some interpretation of events. They also take issue with at least one modern high-profile author, who has done several successful books on McClellan and his leadership of the AoP, on his recounting of this portion of the Maryland Campaign and some likely embellishment of the incidents.

For me the difference between a good book on a historical subject and a great one is the supporting material the authors share with the reader. This book provides that supporting material. Throughout the text the authors provide excellent maps describing the situation that existed when decisions were made and allow the reader to understand how the situation was later reported. The real gold mine, in my opinion, is Appendix A titled "Telegraphic Communications During the Army of the Potomac's March to South Mountain, September 6-13, 1862". This 17 page long section describes how the telegraph system was set up, how it operated, the problems that were encountered because of damage done by the Confederates and the steps a message went thru to get from McClellan's writing table to General Halleck's or President Lincoln's inbox. It contains images of actual messages, describes how dates, names, and other sensitive information was enciphered and how a knowledge of the process can help resolve the question about the timing of key messages. Knowing the mechanics of how information was processed is important in understanding the total story of 'The Lost Orders' and the true role they played in the Campaign.

In summation this book should be on any moderately complete bookshelf of Maryland Campaign Literature





Summer Conference JUNE 9-14, 2023

For nearly 40 years, the Civil War Institute at Gettysburg College has hosted a **premiere annual summer conference** bringing leading historians and public audiences together. Sessions, lodging, and meals are held on the 200-acre college campus.

The 2023 CWI Conference will feature a wide range of topics, including Lincoln as Commander in Chief, the Civil War in Appalachia, Harriet Tubman, John Singleton Mosby, Confederate widowhood, retaliation in the American Civil War, the Army of Tennessee, and more.

In addition to touring the Gettysburg battlefield, participants will have the opportunity to visit a variety of other nearby battlefields and historic sites on tours that will explore Antietam and Harpers Ferry, or to combine a half-day of focused class work with a half-day out on the battlefield, exploring, in-depth, the actions on the 1st or 3rd day of battle at Gettysburg. Participants who may prefer a shorter, more physically active conference experience can also choose to sign up for our new "active track" package, featuring a combination of Friday and Saturday morning lectures and a day and a half of walkingintensive tours of the Gettysburg battlefield on Saturday and Sunday, exploring the First Day's battlefield and the Union Fishhook, off the beaten path!

This conference will also continue the popular "lunch-in" and "dinein" small group discussions with CWI faculty.

The 2023 conference will offer something for everyone, from longtime students of the Civil War to those who are new to Civil War history.
