Speaker: Dr. Stephen Goldman

Presentation Overview: White and Black Servicemen during Reconstruction

In One More War to Fight: Union Veterans' Battle for Equality through Reconstruction, Jim Crow, and the Lost Cause, Dr. Stephen A. Goldman uniquely explains how their obligation to the nation had only begun in 1865. Irrevocably changed by all they'd seen, done, endured, and accomplished, Union servicemen of both races shouldered "the unfinished work" they knew would be as bitter, divisive, and perilous as the Civil War itself. In his talk, Dr. Goldman will focus on the

Freedmen's Bureau remarkable efforts to educate those previously enslaved and protect their rights, marking the beginning of Northern veterans' decades-long postwar commitment to equality for all Americans.

Presenters BIO: Stephen A. Goldman, M.D. is a psychiatrist and international consultant with decades of experience in academic and clinical medicine, public health, and medical product safety. His experience treating and working with those who have been to war, along with in-depth study of the Civil War, Reconstruction, and race, led to his pioneering new book about Union veterans, One More War to Fight. A Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, he is the only physician to serve on the Abraham Lincoln Institute Board of Directors. Currently an Adjunct Professor at Shepherd University, where he teaches seminars in its Honors Program, Dr. Goldman's thought-provoking findings have been welcomed on television, radio, podcasts, and other venues.

For our January program acclaimed historian Eric Buckland engaged roundtable members and guests both in person and via livestream by the NMCWM. a series of three distinct actions executed between Mosby's Rangers and the Union's Cole's Cavalry. Though casualties were always smaller during these engagements, single losses from these small Cavalry organizations impacted greatly. The three encounters all had a lasting impact on the individuals and units, having the impact of shaping their units heritage well beyond the boundaries of the Civil War.





Prez Sez:

It is Black History Month and very appropriately for this month's meeting we have a great speaker to talk about one of the lesser-known aspects of the Union veteran experience, both black and white, after the war. Dr. Steve Goldman will be discussing his work, *One More War to Fight: Union Veterans' Battle for Equality through Reconstruction, Jim Crow, and the Lost Cause.* This should be a fascinating talk and Dr. Goldman will have his book available through the National Museum of Civil War Medicine shop if you are interested.

On the local history front, keep an eye out on our regional historical sites as they are either in the process of or are about to start putting out their events schedule for the season. These include, Monocacy and Antietam National Battlefield, Harpers Ferry National Historic Site, Catoctin Mountain National Park and Gettysburg National Military Park. In addition we have our state sites nearby, Cunningham Falls, Washington Monument / South Mountain, Fort Frederick and many more.

For preservation, checkout the great material that the Sugarloaf Alliance has been putting together about Data Centers. February Book Review

One More War to Fight: Union Veterans' Battle for Equality through Reconstruction, Jim Crow, and the Lost Cause, Stephen A. Goldman, Rowland & Littlefield Publishers, 2023. 448 pgs., images, notes, bibliography, \$29.95 (hardcover), ISBN 978-1538161555. Reviewed by: Matthew A. Borders

For the last decade or so the study of the American Civil War has increasingly focused on the men in the ranks, the effect of the war on those men and how they returned to civilian life after. This should not be surprising due to the societal shift we have seen regarding our modern military. The ending of this nation's longest continuous war has left behind tens of thousands who now must navigate their home country after the trauma of war. Some as physical and or psychological casualties of that war. It is little wonder that we have begun to look back at previous generations of warriors to see how they coped with the same struggles. Where better to look than the bloodiest war we have ever fought? Dr. Stephen Goldman has done just that.


Dr. Goldman's approach to the topic of veterans of the Civil War is unique in two ways, first because he was the original organizer for the papers of the Left-Handed Corps in the Library of Congress. Secondly, he is a trained psychologist who has spent years working with veterans both old and new. The first point deals with one of his key sources for *One More War to Fight*, the Left-Handed Corps was a collection of Federal amputees who, to practice their penmanship with their left hand following the loss of their right, were commissioned to write about their war time experiences, what they did, where they fought and why they enlisted. This incredible collection of essays has only begun to be looked at and Dr. Goldman was the first to do it. These first hand accounts of service and loss, coupled with his own background working with the veterans of today on the same topic has led to this new and inciteful work.


One of the key points that is addressed in *One More War to Fight* is the concept of continued service. How did the men of the ranks see the end of the war and Reconstruction? More importantly, how did they react to the end of Reconstruction and the rise of Jim Crow? This turbulent era saw Union Veterans, white and black, push back against not only Jim Crow, but also the concept of reconciliation itself. This was due primarily to the near abandonment of the issue of slavery as the driver of the war to southern organizations and the establishment of the Lost Cause Mythology that plagued the study of the Civil War for generations. Union veterans pushed back against these narratives in the press and through their own organizations, the Grand Army of the Republic being the largest.


This veteran's organization was one of the most powerful voting blocks in the later 19th and early 20th centuries. Though most of its regional camps were desegregated, African American men who had fought with the United States Colored Troops (USCT) also formed their own camps to share their unique experiences with each other and continue to press for increased rights for those they fought for in the war. The Union veterans of the war continued to support each other and advocate for African American rights even into the 20th century as it was becoming increasingly unpopular to do and it seemed that many wanted to put the war behind them.




