Speaker: Matt Borders Presentation Overview: The Spy Game in Civil War Maryland

Matt's presentation will be on the important and influential use of spies in Maryland during the Civil War by both Union and Confederate forces. The presentation focuses primarily on Central Maryland as it was the highway of three separate Confederate invasions and looks at some of the major personalities both in and out of uniform that were operating throughout the region. The Spy Game in Maryland during the Civil War was a microcosm of the war itself with people of all backgrounds becoming involved in this risky venture. Neighbor distrusted neighbor, and everyone was suspected. Come hear how these first steps in military intelligence gathering led to a

professionalization of the practice as the war continued and why many of the nation's players in intelligence today trace their origins to the Civil War.

Presenters BIO: A graduate of Michigan State and Eastern Michigan University, Matthew Borders holds a BA in United States History with a focus in the American Civil War and a MS in Historic Preservation. Following graduation he taught at Kalamazoo Valley Community College before accepting a position with the National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program. He worked as the historian for the ABPP for six years, during which time he became a certified battlefield guide at Antietam National Battlefield and Harpers Ferry National Historical Site.

Currently, Matthew is a Park Ranger at Monocacy National Battlefield in Frederick, Maryland, a founding member of the Antietam Institute and president of the Frederick County Civil War Round Table. He, along with fellow guide, Joe Stahl, have also published the Faces of Union Soldiers series.

During our February program, Dr. Stephen Goldman deftly addressed his topic, "In One More War to Fight: Union Veterans' Battle for Equality through Reconstruction, Jim Crow, and the Lost Cause". He addressed over 20 in person members and guests, along with those others online via the National Civil War Medicine YouTube live stream, on his extremely unique sample population of Civil War Veterans, derived from a writing contest shortly following the conflict. His in-depth research into the lives of each of these heroic individuals yielded an extremely unique perspective on the reasons for which they fought, and those things that touched them in their lives. For many, their obligation to the nation had only begun in 1865. The body of research highlighted in the strongest terms how they were irrevocably changed by all they'd seen,

done, endured, and accomplished, Union servicemen of both races shouldered "the unfinished work" they knew would be as bitter, divisive, and perilous as the Civil War

itself. Stephen also addressed the historic Freedmen's Bureau, and how its efforts in education and enfranchisement for those previously enslaved.

March Book Review

<u>Colonels in Blue: Union Army Colonels of the Civil War – The Mid-Atlantic States</u> <u>Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware and The District of Columbia, Roger D.</u> <u>Hunt,</u>

Today, many are familiar with Ezra Warner's famous Generals in Blue and Generals in Gray books, documenting the hundreds of Union and Confederate general officers during the American Civil War. These works, as well as the accompanying More Generals in Gray are an excellent starting point for anyone interested in the commanding officers of the war. What is less familiar to most is the Colonels in Blue series by Roger Hunt. This five-book series gives information on every colonel in the United States Army over the course of the Civil War. To take on such a massive project, Roger Hunt broke his books down by region. In the case of this review, the Mid-Atlantic states were covered in the third book of the series. Much like the Generals series by Warner, and Hunt's own Brevet Generals in Blue, the Colonels in Blue series provides information about the officer in question. These are not full-blown biographical essays, like those in Warner's works, but instead, due to the vast number of officers that were covered, only the most pertinent information has been put down. The information provided includes when the officer mustered into Federal service, any promotions they had during their service, and any injuries sustained, as well as when they left the service. Additionally, Roger Hunt has made a real effort to provide a picture with the name and information, so as to give more life to these men.

As implied in the opening paragraph, where the Colonels in Blue series really shines is as a research collection. You absolutely can read these books cover to cover, and a list of rank abbreviations given at the front of the books, to help aid in understanding makes this all the more possible. However, this series is not page after page of biographical information. Instead, almost all personal details of the individuals have been removed in favor of the military details exclusively. A few of the Colonels have details of their lives before or after the war thrown in, but this seems more random than deliberate. For fast, very tight details on Federal colonels during the Civil War it is a great series of work with.

The only issue the Colonels in Blue series suffers from is the lack of more personal details for most entries that would keep a reader engaged. As this series is covering hundreds more subjects than Warner's books did, there seems to be a real desire to keep the ball rolling and not get hung up on details. Again, this makes it a great reference source, but even with the images of the subjects, its hard to determine who these men were with just a picture and their record of service. If you are researching Federal colonels and are looking for a quick reference, go no further than this series. If you are looking for more specifics on the life and times of your favorite regiments commanding officers however, you would probably be better served looking up the unit history or a dedicated biography of the offer.
