Speaker: Bernie Siler

Topic: Parallel Lives - Washington DC in the 19th & 20th Century

Bernie Siler is an attorney in Washington, D.C. whose other passion is the Civil War, particularly regarding the role of African Americans. He has a BA in Anthropology from the University of Dayton, a law degree from the University of Cincinnati and a Masters of International Services from American University. He was recently admitted to the Bar of the International Criminal Court. He lectures regularly at colleges and universities as well as at civic associations on the subject. Specifically, he has been an honorary speaker at several colleges and universities as well as historical associations, including Montgomery College, Maryland where he is an adjunct professor of law. He has been the historian in charge of several Smithsonian Associate tours

involving various aspects of the civil war and other Nineteenth century Washington, D.C. history. His article on "Blacks in the Union Navy" was published in the Washington Times in April 1993. The Washington Post also published his "The Curiosities of the Garfield Assassination" in August 2003. Other publications include, "You Could go to Jail," a legal treatise and "Parallel Lives", a historical novel. As a final show of devotion to this subject, Bernie charged Fort Wagner with Denzel Washington and Mathew Broderick in "Glory", suffered through the horrific conditions as one of 70 plus African American troops among the 30,000 Union prisoners in TNT's "Andersonville" and greeted President Lincoln (Kris Kristofferson) under General Grant's command at City Point, Virginia in "Tad".



February Book Review

<u>Somewhere Toward Freedom: Sherman's March And The Story Of America's Largest</u>
<u>Emancipation</u>, by Bennett Parten, Simon & Schuster, 272 pgs., pictures, maps, notes, \$29.99 (hardcover), ISBN 1668034689. Reviewed by: Matthew A. Borders

There are few events in the American Civil War that cause such a stark reaction as Major General William Tecumseh Sherman's "March to the Sea". Lauded in the North and condemned in the South, the March is seen as one of the many turning points of the war through the breaking of the Confederate home front. On November 15, 1864, just over 60,000 Federal troops began a 300-mile march from Atlanta to Savannah, Georgia, cutting a sixty-mile-wide swath through the Confederate heartland. Nearly unopposed over the course of the March, by its end Sherman had proven Federal dominance of the region and taken the "Hostess City of the South" by December 21.

Though the March is the focus of the first half of *Somewhere Toward Freedom*, the campaign is a character in, not the focus of, Dr. Parten's work. Instead, he views the events of the March to the Sea through the experiences of the freedom seekers following in the wake of the Federal advance. We meet those who had attached themselves to the army during the Federal occupation of Atlanta and thousands of others who joined in the procession as the March pushed deeper and deeper into the Empire State of the South. These formerly enslaved were a tremendous boon to Federal forces, providing information on Confederate resistance, conditions along the line of march and providing escorts for Federal foraging parties. All while packing up their own families in any way possible to follow, in many cases literally walking away from the only homes they had ever known.

While the March itself was seen by freedom seekers as part of the "Day of Jubilee", and Sherman's forces were seen as liberators. Dr. Parten is careful to also make clear that this was never Sherman's intention. The Federal Army became the instrument with which the enslaved freed themselves, but army policy was to turn away all but those who could aid in the army's advance. This forced refugees to the back of the columns, where they were in danger of being separated or even attacked by Confederate cavalry that nipped at the edges of the army. Sherman's reluctance to protect the evergrowing flood of refugees was emphasized by the tragedy of Ebenezer Creek on December 9, when Federal General Jefferson C. Davis pulled up the bridge over the creek prior to the former enslaved crossing. This act led to hundreds being stranded and sadly recaptured by the Confederate cavalry. Somewhere Towards Freedom moves beyond the March the Sea after Sherman reached Savannah. By that point an estimated 20,000 freedom seekers had made the harrowing trek behind the army to the coast. What was to happen to this mass of humanity became just as harrowing as the March had been. They soon were shipped to Port Royal and attached to the growing freedman community there. This influx, however, had a destabilizing effect on the region that brought out both the best and the worst in those who had helped establish the so-called Port Royal Experiment in 1862. It was during this period that the famous "40 acres and a mule" was established by Sherman himself and developed by the early Freedman's Bureau. Glimmers of hope in incredibly trying times that only became harder as the war ended in the spring of 1865. How those who made the March survived, thrived and dealt with a system stacked against them makes for a fascinating read.
