“Point Lookout and the Second Wave of Prisons”.

As the Civil War progressed into its third bloody year, federal campaigns were sending thousands of prisoners north in numbers that overwhelmed existing prisons. Furthermore, the forced cessation of a prisoner exchange cartel compounded the burden of the already overcrowded prison system, further denying the Confederate government of its much-needed manpower. By mid-1863, a desperate Commissary General of Prisoners, Colonel William Hoffman, began scouring the northern states, seeking locations to build new camps to better manage this sudden influx of prisoners. Hoffman’s latest prison, Point Lookout, began the succession of new holding areas in what is now referred to as the “Second Wave of Prisons”.



About the Author

Born in Washington D.C., Robert E. Crickenberger Jr., has lived in Southern Maryland for over sixty years. He has been a husband, father, and grandfather for almost fifty years and a veteran of the United States Navy, having served during the Vietnam War era from 1971 to 1977.

Robert began his forty-plus-year sojourn as a volunteer and living historian at Point Lookout State Park in 1978. He has continually served as President of the Friends of Point Lookout and is a Historic Weapons Safety Officer for the Maryland Park Service. Mr. Crickenberger has been awarded the title of Honorary Ranger for the Maryland Park Service for his dedication and organization of historical events and has been instrumental in the reconstruction and restoration of both the Civil War fort (*the only earthen fort that remains in the state of Maryland*) and the Civil War prison site.

Mr. Crickenberger has researched and studied the topic of Civil War Point Lookout for over forty years. His presentations on the occupation of Point Lookout are based on that extensive research he has accumulated in those years. Robert has utilized both Confederate and Union accounts to conduct tours of the historical locations, including the Confederate prison, federal occupation, and their auxiliary sites. He has written and assisted in designing many of the historical interpretive signs exhibited throughout Point Lookout State Park and the park's tour book and museum.

In 2025, he was awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Historic Preservation Commission of St. Mary's County, Maryland for his contribution to the historical preservation of Civil War Point Lookout. His first book, ***Point Lookout, Maryland. The Civil War's Largest Prison*** is scheduled to be released February 15, 2026, by Savas Beattie Publishing (LLC).



January Book Review

“He Is Our Colonel and We Are His Soldiers” by James R. Droege Meyer, NMCWM Press, 116 pgs., notes, index, pictures, \$5.99 (paperback), ASIN B004RCLW0E. Review by Matthew Borders

If you are looking for a solid regimental history on the 106th New York Infantry, this is not it. That being said, *He is Our Colonel and We are His Soldiers*, does offer a unique perspective on the regiment. Written by James Droege Meyer, this work follows Colonel Edward James from roughly August 1862 to August 1863, essentially the period that the regiment was stationed in Western Virginia. The book is based off Colonel James war time writings and is told through the view of a fictitious soldier. This style has given the author an incredible amount of leeway, as he can view the regiment and its men from essentially any angle he needs to.

Reading this book was not an attempt to choose a random regiment to research. The 106th New York was one of the veteran VI Corps regiments rushed to Monocacy Junction in early July 1864. Obtaining a deeper knowledge of that regiment and its service, particularly during the summer of 1864, was the primary reason I picked up this book. Though that aspect of their service is not looked at, there are still some excellent details regarding the development and first year of service for these New Yorkers. Because the work is based so heavily on Colonel James’ writings, there are details that would have been unknown to just about anyone else at the time. It is very clear, very quickly, that the colonel of the 106th New York wants to have the best regiment he can and is personally involved, not only in the military aspects of their service, but also the logistics of their service. There are extensive descriptions of supplies and supply shortages, delays in payment and requisitions for tents.

Colonel James was not the regiment’s first commanding officer and by the time of his arrival in August 1862, he is trying to bring the 106th New York up to the same level as the regiments around them. Some of those regiments, the 106th New York will serve alongside their entire enlistment, such as the 126th Ohio, which makes an appearance while they are stationed in Western Virginia. It is interesting to note that the 106th New York was almost transformed into a Zouave regiment, and the details of their proposed uniform (black with yellow!) are gone over in detail. The regimental band also received significant attention from Colonel James in the first year of the regiments service. It is particularly interesting to note the band as the Federal Government had significantly downsized bands by July 1862, so for the 106th New York to essentially have a full brass band in the winter of 1862-1863 was somewhat unique.

While *He is Our Colonel and We are His Soldiers*, was not what I expected, it was still a good, fast read that provided a lot of detail and insight into the lives and living conditions of the common soldier during the American Civil War. I would have liked more citations, but the excellent use of images and the fast pace of the book did help with its readability as well.
